## *College of Arts and Sciences*



**Sam Huckaba** became the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences in 2012. Previously he served as the Senior Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and a professor of mathematics. He is the chief academic and administrative officer of Florida State's oldest and largest college, which is widely recognized for its outstanding academic programs and high productivity in research and creative activity.

Dr. Huckaba has had an outstanding record of academic and administrative experience. Before joining the Dean's office as Associate Dean, he participated widely in departmental administration for his home department. This included four years leading the graduate program as Associate Chair for Graduate Studies, where he helped the department to double the size of its graduate program.

Dr. Huckaba has been recognized several times for his work in the classroom at FSU by twice receiving a University Teaching Award. He also received an Arts and Sciences Teaching Award and a Teaching Incentive Program Award. In addition, his scholarship was recognized when he received a Developing Scholar Award.

Dr. Huckaba earned a B.A. degree in mathematics from the University of Missouri and his masters and doctoral degrees in mathematics from Purdue University. He has published research in the areas of commutative algebra and algebraic geometry, two classical areas of pure mathematics, and has pursued interests toward applications of algebra, including cryptography and coding theory.

## *College of Business*



**Michael D. Hartline** became the Interim Dean of the College of Business in 2015. He is also the Charles A. Bruning Professor of Business Administration. Previously, he was the Associate Dean for Strategic Initiatives and was responsible for external relations, marketing/branding, executive education, and strategic programs.

Dr. Hartline has played a major role in the college's development efforts, securing several million dollars in support for the college, its programs, faculty, and Legacy Hall. He served as Chair of the College of Business Building Program Committee, acting as liaison to university administration and the broader community. He has also served as chair of the Department of Marketing.

Before coming to Florida State University, he was an associate professor of marketing at Samford University's Brock School of Business; assistant professor of marketing at Louisiana State University's E.J. Ourso College of Business; and assistant professor of marketing and advertising at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock's College of Business. Dr. Hartline has won numerous teaching and research awards including the Award for Teaching Excellence at Louisiana State University and MBA Teaching Award at the University of Arkansas, Little Rock.

Dr. Hartline earned a B.S. degree in Marketing and a MBA degree in Business Administration from Jacksonville State University in Jacksonville, AL and a Ph.D. degree in Business Administration from the Fogelman College of Business and Economics at the University of Memphis. He has authored or co-authored a number of books and articles, served on the editorial review boards of several academic journals, made numerous presentations to industry and academic audiences, and chaired two international conferences. His research interests include customer-contact issues in service delivery, service quality and productivity, new service development, and non-ownership consumption.

## *College of Communication & Information*



**Lawrence C. Dennis** became the Dean of the College of Communication and Information in 2004. The college is comprised of 3 nationally ranked schools including the School of Communication, the School of Communication Science and Disorders, and the School of Information.

Previously, he was Dean of the FSU's College of Information, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs, and Director of the Office for Distributed and Distance Learning (ODDL) at FSU. In addition, he has served as acting Director of the FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute.

Dr. Dennis has won a University Teaching Award and two State of Florida Teaching Incentive Program Awards. In his role as Director of ODDL, he has gained extensive experience developing online degree programs and applying technology to instruction. He served on the Board of Directors of the Southeastern University Research Association, as Chairman for the CLAS Collaboration Coordinating Committee, and as a member of the EDUCAUSE Advisory Committee on Teaching and Learning.

He earned his B.S. degree in Physics at the University of Michigan and his Ph.D. degree in Nuclear Physics at the University of Virginia. His research focuses on applying information technology of portals, web services, grid computing, and distributed computing to large nuclear physics experiments and education. Current research interests include information systems and architectures, IT project management and governance and educational organization.



## *College of Criminology and Criminal Justice*



**Thomas G. Blomberg** became the Dean of the College of Criminology and Criminal Justice in 2004. He is also the Sheldon L. Lessinger Professor of Criminology and Executive Director of the Center for Criminology and Public Policy Research.

The college has developed a new educational partnership within FSU aimed at providing the students access to newly emerging education and career path alternatives. These include the 3 plus 3 Program with the College of Law, Forensic Accounting with the College of Business, and Computer Criminology with the Department of Computer Science. The Center for Criminology and Public Policy Research is engaged in numerous research and policy studies that afford the students funding and research opportunities in various areas such as education and crime, elderly exploitation, financial fraud, juvenile and adult reentry, prison drug treatment and recidivism, domestic violence, campus sexual misconduct, electronic surveillance, and numerous other areas.

Dr. Blomberg received his B.S. degree in Sociology from the University of California at Berkeley and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Criminology from the University of California at Berkeley. His research is focused upon identifying ways to more effectively link research knowledge to public policy. This includes examining the relationship between educational achievement among incarcerated youthful offenders and successful community reintegration. The research has shown that youth who experience disproportionate increases in academic achievement are more likely to return to school following their release and if they remain in school, their likelihood of re-arrest drops significantly. His current research is concerned with elderly financial fraud that is centered upon a national survey of citizens aged 65 or over regarding their fraud-related victimization experiences.

## *College of Education*



**Marcy P. Driscoll** became the Dean of the College of Education in 2005. She is also the Leslie J. Briggs Professor of Educational Research and a professor in the Instructional Systems and Learning Technology Program within FSU's Department of Educational Psychology and Learning Systems.

Dr. Driscoll has recently focused her effort on issues related to leadership in higher education, education policy, and teacher education. She was co-PI on a grant from the Florida Department of Education that established the Florida Center for Research in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (FCR-STEM) and co-PI on FSU-Teach, which established an innovative teacher preparation program in math and science education. In addition, she has earned a number of awards in recognition of excellence in undergraduate and graduate teaching.

Dr. Driscoll's past appointments include serving as Chair of the Department of Educational Psychology and Learning Systems and as Associate Dean of Research and Administration for the College of Education. She is President of the Council of Academic Deans from Research Education Institutions (CADREI) and is also Past President of the Association for Educational Communications and Technology (AECT).

She received her A.B. magna cum laude from Mt. Holyoke College and her M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Educational Psychology from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. Dr. Driscoll's prior research centered on learning, instructional theory, and educational semiotics. She is the author or co-author of eight textbooks and an edited research handbook in learning and instruction, and has published numerous articles in professional journals on learning and instruction theory. Her book titled *Psychology of Learning for Instruction* won the 1995 Outstanding Book Award in Instructional Development from AECT and has been translated into Korean, Turkish and Chinese. Now in its 3rd edition, it remains a top-ranked book in the instructional systems field.

## *College of Engineering*



**Bruce R. Locke** became interim Dean at the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering in 2015. He also serves as Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs at FSU's Office of the Provost and Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs. He is a Distinguished Research Professor in the Department of Chemical and Biomedical Engineering and has also served as Department Chair.

Dr. Locke has received several awards including the Developing Scholar Award from FSU and Engineering Research Award from FAMU-FSU College of Engineering. He has also been an invited visiting professor at the University of Poitiers in Poitiers France and Kumamoto University in Japan.

Dr. Locke received his B.E. degree in Chemical Engineering and Environmental and Water Resources from Vanderbilt University, M.S. degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Houston, and his Ph.D. degree in Chemical Engineering from North Carolina University. Dr. Locke's research interests include plasma reaction engineering and metabolic engineering in muscle. He developed and analyzed electrical discharge plasma reactors for air and water pollution control and for the synthesis of hydrogen peroxide, nitrates, and other compounds.

He also focuses on metabolic modeling in biological systems, in which he conducted research on reaction-diffusion processes governing energy metabolism in skeletal muscle. The overall goal is to develop a better understanding of the spatial and kinetic parameters that control metabolism in normal and diseased tissue. He has published numerous peer-reviewed papers and book chapters and holds 6 patents with 4 patent applications in process. His work has been most recently funded by the National Science Foundation and FSU.

### *College of Fine Arts*



**Peter Weishar** became the Dean of the College of Fine Arts (formerly the College of Visual Arts, Theatre, and Dance) in 2013. Previously he was Dean of the School of Film, Digital Media, and Performing Arts at the Savannah College of Art and Design. Dr. Weishar served as a professor at the NYU Interactive Telecommunications Program and then later as professor of computer animation and new media, as well as acting director of the animation program at New York University Tisch School of the Arts.

At FSU Dean Weishar provides leadership to six academic departments, as well as oversees the Florida State University Museum of Fine Arts, the Facility for Arts Research in Tallahassee, and the John and Mable Ringling Center for the Arts in Sarasota, which includes the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory for Actor Training, and the FSU Performing Arts Center.

Dean Weishar earned his bachelors degree at Union College with honors in Studio Art. He went on to study at the Rhode Island School of Design and Tel Aviv University. He is the author of three books on digital art and animation: *Digital Space: Designing Virtual Environments*, *Blue Sky: The Art of Computer Animation*, and *CGI: The Art of the Computer Generated Image*.

### *College of Human Sciences*



**Michael Delp** became the Dean of the College of Human Sciences in 2014. FSU's College of Human Sciences is the fourth largest college and composed of multidisciplinary academic units that address the health and development of individuals, families, and communities.

The College of Human Sciences is one of the largest colleges of its kind in the nation and the only comprehensive human sciences unit in Florida. It has consistently been ranked one of the top 10 programs in human sciences nationally in terms of graduate and undergraduate enrollment, degrees granted, contracts and grants, program costs, numbers of professorships, and total endowments. Several breakthrough research projects have contributed to the college's legacy.

Prior to coming to FSU, Dr. Delp was a Professor and Chair of the Department of Applied Physiology and Kinesiology at the University of Florida, a Professor and Vice Chair in the Division of Exercise Physiology at the West Virginia School of Medicine, and a faculty member in the Department of Health and Kinesiology at Texas A & M University. He has also served as the Alexander von Humboldt Research Fellow at the University of Konstanz in Konstanz, Germany and was a postdoctoral fellow in the Department of Medical Sciences, College of Veterinary Medicine, at the University of Missouri.

Dr. Delp received his B.S. degree from Oral Roberts University with a major in Biomedical Chemistry and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Georgia in Exercise Physiology. Dr. Delp's research interests are primarily focused on understanding the effects of physical activity on the cardiovascular system, and more specifically on cardiovascular function. He is nationally recognized for his research on the effects of physical activity associated with aging, space flight, and diseases, such as diabetes, on the cardiovascular system. His research has been funded by NASA for 20 years

## College of Law



**Donald J. Weidner** was Dean of the College of Law from 1991 to 1997 and began another term in 2000 after having served as interim dean. He announced his retirement as Dean, effective June 2016, and will continue to be a member of the faculty after he retires as dean. He is also the Alumni Centennial Professor.

Under Dean Weidner's leadership, the College of Law has risen to the top tier of U.S. law schools and has been consistently recognized as one of the nation's best in terms of job placement. FSU's annual giving rate has increased by approximately 500 percent, making it one of the nation's 10 best law schools in terms of alumni giving. Similarly, the law college's endowment has increased by more than 600 percent. He was named one of Nine Transformative Law Deans of the Last Decade by *The Leiter Report* and has received the Guardian of the Flame Award for advancing student-faculty relations from a FSU campus-wide group of student leaders.

Dr. Weidner has established and cultivated countless new programs. They include the Summer for Undergraduates "pipeline" program, new 3+3 programs that allow students to complete undergraduate and law degrees in six years instead of seven, LL.M programs for foreign lawyers and for lawyers interested in environmental law, certificate programs in business, environmental and international law, and a one-year Juris Master program. He also oversaw the acquisition and renovation of a 50,000-square-foot former courthouse as an expansion of the law school's physical plant.

Dean Weidner received his B.S. degree in Psychology from Fordham University and his JD degree from the University of Texas at Austin. He is a recognized authority on partnerships, fiduciary duties, and real estate finance. He is the co-author of The Revised Uniform Partnership Act and has also written on taxation of real estate transactions and organizations, capital accounts, and the use of special purpose entities.

## College of Medicine



**John ("J.") Fogarty** became the Dean of the College of Medicine in 2008. Previously he served as Chair of Family Medicine and Interim Dean at the University of Vermont College of Medicine. Prior to arriving in Tallahassee, he served as Senior Associate Dean for Operations and Associate Dean for Primary Care at UVM. Dr. Fogarty is Board Certified in Family Medicine and a Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians.

Dr. Fogarty spent the first 20 years of his career as an Army family physician and academic leader, rising to the rank of colonel, and served the last five years of his military career as Chair of Family Medicine at the Uniformed Services University School of Health Sciences in Bethesda, MD. In that position he oversaw family medicine clinical clerkship sites in six states in an educational model similar to FSU's system of regional campuses based in six Florida cities.

In 2007, Dr. Fogarty was honored by the Vermont Academy of Family Physicians as Vermont's Family Physician of the Year and also received the Distinguished Service Award from the Vermont Medical Society. This is the

highest honor the society bestows for meritorious service in the science and art of medicine, as well as for outstanding contributions to the medical profession, its organizations, and the welfare of the public. Since coming to Florida, he has served as Chair of the Council of Florida Medical School Deans, recently served as Chair of the Governing Council of the Section on Medical Schools of the AMA, and presently serves as Chair of the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME), the national accrediting body for medical schools in the United States and Canada.

Dr. Fogarty received his B.S. degree from the U.S. Military Academy in West Point, NY and his M.D. degree from Albany Medical College of Union University in Albany, NY. His research interests include preventative and behavioral issues for families and medical students, sports medicine, and primary care practice. He is the author of multiple articles and book chapters with a focus on ambulatory care and family practice topics for physicians, nurses, physician assistants, and medical soldiers.

## College of Motion Picture Arts



**Frank Patterson** became the Dean of the College of Motion Picture Arts in 2003. The college is a top-ranked film school, which has become one of the most competitive and recognized film programs around the world, and recognized by the Directors Guild of America for its distinguished contribution to American culture through the world of film and television. Dean Patterson is a filmmaker, educator, and consultant, who has produced, written, and directed feature films, commercials, and a variety of media content. He most recently produced the Michael Jackson Hologram show on the 2014 Billboard Music Awards, which aired on the ABC Network to more than 11 million viewers.

Prior to serving as Dean at FSU, Dean Patterson held offices as the Associate Dean and Director of the Film School at Chapman University in Orange, CA, and President of the Los Angeles Film School in Hollywood, CA. He has taught film production and screenwriting at The University of Texas, Baylor University, and Chapman University, after serving as the inaugural head of production for the College of Motion Picture Arts. The Hollywood Reporter has named Frank Patterson as one of the “nation’s top mentors to a generation of Hollywood filmmakers,” and the Florida Governor’s Office recognized him for “inspiring a generation of Florida filmmakers” and for his contribution to and support of film production in Florida.”

Dean Patterson holds B.A. and M.A. degrees in Communications with a major in Film and Digital Media from Baylor University. His interests are in motion picture producing, writing, and directing, and most recently in the creative development of digital human production projects.

## College of Music



**Patricia J. Flowers** became the Dean of the College of Music in 2013. Previously, she served as Professor and Chair of Graduate Studies in Music at Ohio State University. Prior to her Ohio State tenure, Flowers was a member of the music faculty at the University of Texas at San Antonio.

Among the nation’s largest music programs in higher education, the FSU College of Music’s comprehensive curricula embrace all traditional areas of music and world music study from the baccalaureate to the doctoral level. U.S. News & World Report has ranked the quality of Florida State’s College of Music at 12th in the nation and fifth among programs at public universities. Dr. Flowers is honored by the privilege of leading the College of Music, one of America’s finest comprehensive music programs and a source of pride for the state of Florida, indicating that it has been a special joy to come home to her alma mater.

Originally an oboist, Dr. Flowers earned her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees at Kent State University and her Ph.D. degree in music at Florida State. She has received recognition

from both institutions as a distinguished alumna. She is the author of numerous scholarly music publications, research presentations and lectures. Dr. Flowers has a long record of research and professional publication focused primarily on childhood music development and music listening. She has earned numerous awards and recognitions throughout her distinguished career in music education, including the 2012 Senior Researcher Award given biennially by the National Association for Music Education.

### *College of Nursing*



**Judith McFetridge-Durdle** became the Dean of the College of Nursing in 2013. Prior to her appointment to FSU, she served as Dean of the School of Nursing at Memorial University of Newfoundland.

Dr. McFetridge-Durdle has taught across baccalaureate, masters, and doctoral programs at universities in Florida, North Carolina, and Nova Scotia, Canada. From 2003-2009, she served as Mentor and Associate Director of the FUTURE Program, the Cardiovascular Nurse Scientist Training Program funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research.

Dr. McFetridge-Durdle is also passionate about interprofessional education and with collaborators at Dalhousie University. She developed and tested an educational intervention that brought health professional students together to address an identified gap in healthcare, namely the transition from hospital to home.

Dr. McFetridge-Durdle holds baccalaureate and graduate degrees in nursing from Dalhousie University (Nova Scotia), a Ph.D. degree in Nursing from the University of Florida, and completed postdoctoral studies in behavioral medicine at Duke University. Dr. McFetridge-Durdle's program of research is the role of psychological stress in heart disease, particularly in women. The findings from her research have been presented at national and international venues and are published in nursing, medicine, and physiology journals. To support her research, she has received funding from the National Institutes of Health, the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, and Health Canada.

### *College of Social Sciences*



**David W. Rasmussen** became the Dean of the College of Social Sciences and Public Policy in 2003. He is also the James H. Gapinski Professor of Economics. He has served as an assistant, associate, and full professor at FSU, as well as the Director of the Policy Sciences Program and the Director of the DeVoe L. Moore Center for the Study of Critical Issues of Government and Policy.

As an award-winning teacher and scholar, Dr. Rasmussen has received a Teaching Incentive Program Award and a Professorial Excellence Program Award. He has served as a consultant to domestic and international government agencies and nonprofit organizations, and is a member of the Board of Directors of the LeRoy Collins Institute, the Florida State University Panama Foundation, and the FSU International Programs Association.

Dr. Rasmussen studied at the University of Helsinki, Finland, received his B.A. degree in Economics from Earlham College, Richmond, IN, and received his Ph.D. degree from Washington University in St. Louis. He has written (or co-authored) five books, published numerous articles in leading professional journals, and been an editor or on the editorial boards of numerous journals. His scholarly research and policy evaluation studies have addressed important public policy questions, including economics of inequality, urban and regional economic development, crime and substance abuse policy, and housing economics.

## *College of Social Work*



**James J. Clark** became the Dean of the College of Social Work in 2015. FSU's College of Social Work is the oldest program in Florida and one of the first programs in the southeast. He previously served as professor and director of the School of Social Work in the University of Cincinnati's College of Allied Health Sciences.

Prior to his tenure at the University of Cincinnati, Dr. Clark held numerous faculty and administrative positions for over 21 years at the University of Kentucky College of Social Work. He served as the Constance Wilson Professor of Mental Health, Associate Dean for Research, and Director of the Doctoral Program. He also held a joint appointment as associate professor with the Department of Psychiatry in the University of Kentucky College of Medicine.

Throughout his career, Clark has designed and provided behavioral health consultation and educational programs for judges, lawyers, and other court personnel. He served as a member of the National Child Traumatic Stress Network's Justice Committee, as the lead member of the Council on Social Work Education's National Research Integrity Workgroup, and as an appointed member of the National Federation of Clinical Social Work's Forensic Social Work Committee.

Dr. Clark received his B.A. degree from Siena College in New York, a MSW degree from the University of Kentucky, and a Ph.D. degree in Clinical Social Work from the University of Chicago. With his focus on forensic social work, legal and ethical issues, and trauma informed translational research, Dr. Clark works at the nexus of the justice, mental health and child welfare systems. He has published in the areas of substance abuse, criminal justice and child traumatic stress, and he is currently co-editing a book for the American Bar Association on best practices in death penalty mitigation.
